Ahead of the bank holiday weekend I met with the local Neighbourhood Police Inspector, Mick Hood in Cullercoats to get an update on Operation Coast Watch, the initiative to tackle anti-social behaviour at the coast.

It has been a successful joint initiative between the police, council, Nexus and local stakeholders and it's important that it continues with the resources in place to tackle anti-social behaviour at the coast, especially over the summer.

I liaised with Northumbria Police Chief Constable Vanessa Jardine during the recent disorder which we saw in communities across our region.

I expressed my support and gratitude for all her officers were doing to restore calm and order and help ensure swift and severe consequences for those who break the law.





I had a really informative visit to the council's Working Well Hub. Based at the Beacon Centre in North Shields, it's home to the council's Employment and Skills Team and hosts a range of partners including the NHS, North

East Autism Society, North Tyneside Carers Centre, North Tyneside Citizen's Advice and Age UK North Tyneside.

Working Well North Tyneside was created to simplify the process of finding and securing jobs by bringing together a wide range of support services in one place.

The initiative offers expert employment advice and addresses common barriers to employment, such as finance, debt, housing, and physical and mental health issues.

By providing these crucial resources, the service empowers individuals to take control of their future and fulfil their aspirations.

As Working Well North Tyneside continues to grow, the programme remains dedicated to supporting even more residents on their journey to stable and fulfilling employment.

The Working Well hubs in North Shields and Wallsend are open from 9.30am to 3.30pm, Monday to Friday.

Historic England Funding

for Coastal Locations



Historic England has announced new funding for its Everyday Heritage grants programme, celebrating working class histories. This time, with a focus on buildings or places in rural and coastal locations.

Historic England is inviting community and heritage organisations across the country to apply for grants of up to £25,000 through its Everyday Heritage Grants: Celebrating Working Class Histories.

Each project should enable people to share untold stories about the places where they live, encouraging communities to examine and tell their own stories in their own ways.

Applications open on Friday 16 August and close on Monday 7 October.

Congratulations to local students



A big congratulations to all those students who got their exam results this summer.

I also want to pay tribute to all the education professionals who have been part of the enormous effort to support children before and following the pandemic.

Three years post pandemic, there is still a clear need for an evidence-based intervention to address the impact of learning loss and the ongoing challenges across our education system. Disadvantaged primary school pupils remain months behind their peers in reading and maths. The attainment gap at GCSE is at its widest since 2012. The recent GCSE results also highlighted a worrying regional divide.

Breaking down the barriers to opportunity is the aim of this Government, and it is one that I am committed to delivering for our local area.
